# Longing for Jesus

One of the things I appreciate most about Methodism is the emphasis on the seasons of Advent, Lent, Easter, and Ordinary Time. For me, Advent is one of the seasons that shapes me most deeply. It reminds me that we are a waiting people who long for God to move, guide, and renew. I think of David's words from Psalm 62:5, "For God alone my soul waits in silence; my hope is from Him." We all carry hopes, questions, and weariness, and Advent invites us to bring those honestly before God as we long for the second advent of Jesus.

In our world of instant everything, waiting feels like an inconvenience. But Advent invites us to name our longings rather than rush past them. It tells the truth about life, that we live between the already and the not yet. Christ has come, and Christ will come again. I see this longing in our community: longing for peace in the midst of chaos and heartbreak, for healing from fractured relationships, for authentic connection with others, for true rest, for joy in the mundane. Advent doesn't shame these desires; it honors them. It teaches us that longing is not a weakness; it's a sign that we were made for more than what this broken world can offer. It drives us to the only One who can restore and satisfy our souls. So we celebrate that Christ has come, we remember that He is with us, and we hope as we longingly wait for His return.

### Introduction

Every Sunday in the season of Advent in each worship service we will light a candle, have a special prayer, and a special scripture reading. This season in our traditional worship our choir will also sing each benediction to end the service. As certain families come to light the candle, these candles represent specific themes: Hope, Joy, Love, Peace. You will observe one large white candle encircled by three purple candles and a pink candle. Each candle represents these themes and on Christmas Eve we will light the large white candle, the Christ Candle, at our evening Christmas Eve services. These subtle reminders help us to understand what all Christ brings to His children at His coming: hope of eternal life, peace to the world as He is the Prince of Peace, love undeniable, and joy, which is often unspeakable and magnificent.

As you continue to read throughout this Advent Guide, you will hear from our staff and why Advent is such an important season for them and what they love most about it. You will also find a list of important dates and information for the Advent season with all our worship services, special events, and serving opportunities.

Our hope and prayer as a staff is that this Guide to the Season will be a helpful tool and guide for you this Advent season. Inside, you'll find a calendar of events for the season, insight from each staff member on what Advent means to them, a calendar of special program ministry events like the Nativity play and others, and you'll hopefully have a guide as to what Advent is all about. In this season of intentional waiting and anticipation for the Lord's coming, I pray that you find peace in the waiting, peace in Christ, and assurance of His return. May this be a season for you of deep prayer, service, community, and witness to Christ and His Church.

### COME, LORD JESUS

"Oh, how my soul praises the Lord. How my spirit rejoices in God my Savior! For he took notice of his lowly servant girl, and from now on all generations will call me blessed. For the Mighty One is holy, and he has done great things for me. He shows mercy from generation to generation to all who fear him."

Mary had every right to be scared. She was young, engaged to a man named Joseph, and now told she was pregnant. And to top it all off, the news was delivered by an angel! I would be scared, too! And as Mary processed the news, I can only imagine what was going through her head – would her family disown her, would Joseph believe any of this – why me?

But Mary chose to settle on faith and not fear. Later on, when Mary visited her cousin, Elizabeth, she reminded Mary, "You are blessed because you believed that the Lord would do what he said," (vs 45).

It would be nice to say that our typical response to fear is always faith. But let's be honest. Fear creeps into our minds and we focus on the "what ifs." But what was Mary's response? She turned her attention to God in a song known as the Magnificat (which means "my soul glorifies the Lord"). The whole song is about singing of God's glory. Of course, she still had many questions in her mind, but she chose to trust God's plan and rejoice in God's glory and goodness.

Mary knew what we sometimes forget - that God is in control. She was reminded that she was chosen to be a part of God's plan for the redemption of the world. Mary replaced the fear and uncertainty that she felt with praise that God had chosen her as part of God's plan for the redemption of the world. Faith replaced fear!

Have you ever felt overwhelmed by fear and uncertainty? Advent and Christmas call on us to trust in the plan of God – to replace our doubt and fear with faith.

Prayer: God of Love, Your Son, Jesus, is Your greatest gift to us. He is the ultimate sign of your love. He is our assurance that God has not forgotten or forsaken us. Help us walk in that love and assurance during the weeks of Advent. As we wait and prepare for His coming, may the Holy Spirit guide us to deeper levels of trust and faith.

We pray in the name of Jesus, our Savior. Amen.
