Introduction

What Is Lent?

Lent is a unique season, in the life of the church, of self-denial. It's a season of the church where we, the people of God, deny ourselves and fast for 40 days as we seek to grow closer to Christ on the journey to the cross. It seems strange, in a culture like ours where the goal is to gain as much as possible, to deny ourselves. If we need something, our culture tells us, we just ask or apply for it. Our culture tells us we should never go without. Our culture tells us we have everything at our fingertips, and they are right. The truth of what our culture says is all the more reason to practice Lent fully this year. To tell our soul, "You have everything, but I'm going to give everything up for the sake of knowing Christ." Jesus says, "If you're going to follow me you must deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow me. What does it profit a man to gain the world and lose his soul? The one who seeks to save his life will lose it and the one who loses his life for my sake will save it." In a world where everything is a click away, a charge on our credit card and 48-hour shipping, and a world where we can reach anyone in the world in seconds, we must practice denying ourselves for the glory of God and knowing Him.

I pray this Guide to the Season will bless you as you hear from our staff on why Lent is so important. In this edition, you'll notice a few things of great importance: a list of what to fast from and fast for; a schedule of happenings throughout Lent including special services and emphasis through this season; our Family Discipleship Guide which will be the theme of our <u>Know Grow Go</u> podcast, Wednesday night studies, and Lenten Luncheons throughout the season of Lent. I hope this Guide to the Season is a tool to help you along the journey to the cross and the empty tomb as we begin with self-denial. May God be with you on this journey.

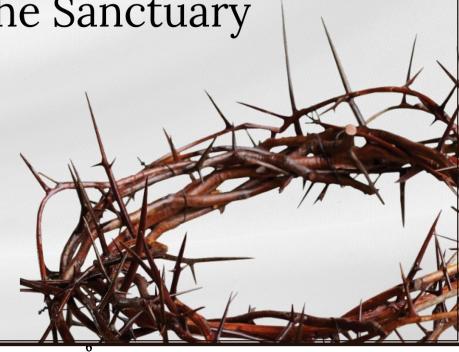

Something More

Sacrifice. Repentance. Contemplation. These words call us to something deeper than abstaining from sugar or social media. Lent is a time of self-reflection, prayer, and fasting to quiet our hearts, still our minds, and remember the mission and sacrifice of Christ. This is the key focus of George Herbert's poem "Lent." Below are a few of the stanzas, but I encourage you to find and read the full work. This season of Lent, I'm going to "improve [my] fast," not let one's "abuse of Lent spoil [its] good use," and give up something that will help me in my striving towards holiness.

Then those same pendant profits, which the spring And Easter intimate, enlarge the thing, And goodness of the deed. Neither ought other men's abuse of Lent Spoil the good use; lest by that argument We forfeit all our Creed. It's true, we cannot reach Christ's forti'eth day; Yet to go part of that religious way, Is better than to rest: We cannot reach our Saviour's purity; Yet we are bid, 'Be holy ev'n as he,' In both let's do our best. Yet Lord instruct us to improve our fast By starving sin and taking such repast, As may our faults control: That ev'ry man may revel at his door, Not in his parlour; banqueting the poor, And among those his soul.

No Hallelujahs

In the ancient church, a practice during Lent was not to echo a hallelujah throughout the entire season. Hallelujahs of the church echo in Heaven at the culmination of Lent on Easter Sunday when we all proclaim, "Hallelujah! He is risen!" At the heart of Lent is the cruciality of denying ourselves and all we have for the simple sake of knowing Christ and His good news, and experiencing suffering as He did. As we make this journey together I hope you are as excited as I am for what the Lord will do in our church as we commit to this time together. Please, consider a few things this Lent:

- 1. Pray with and for your family.
- 2. Read through the Gospels with your family.
- 3. Find a new area in the church or community to serve once weekly as part of your spiritual discipline.
- 4. Fast from food for an entire day (safely if you have medical conditions or medicine which require a standard diet adhere to your doctor's recommendations).
- 5. Journal at the end of each day where you've seen God, where you've sinned, and where you fell short. Then pray for God to enable you to do better tomorrow.

These are just a few ideas of things to do, as a <u>family</u> this season, to increase spiritual intimacy and depth with everyone in your family. If you don't have any family in the church then adopt one and see how you can connect with them. May this season of Lent be impactful and life-changing for you and your family.

My Struggle

I am not sure about you, but I have struggled over the years with fasting during Lent. I have never been able to grasp how giving up chocolate or Diet Coke draws me closer to God, so I just skip over the fasting aspect of Lent. My problem, I think, is connecting fasting to a deeper relationship with God. I did not grow up practicing Lent, and my first Ash Wednesday service was here at our church in the early 2000s. Over the years when fasting discussions have come up, I've never quite grasped its significance or the impact it should have on my spiritual life. This year I decided enough was enough. I needed to figure this fasting thing out. I've spent time reading articles, listening to podcasts, and talking to Matt, after which I realized my problem has been thinking that fasting and abstaining are the same when, in fact, they're not. To abstain from something is to simply refrain from doing or partaking in something you're used to doing or having. But fasting is deeper than that. True fasting is giving up something that the absence of that thing causes discomfort or is an inconvenience. In this sense, fasting is more sacrificial than abstaining. Biblical fasting is giving up all food for a time, not just soda, coffee, or sugar. While you sit in the discomfort of feeling hungry, you pray, read Scripture, listen to podcasts, or do anything that helps fill you spiritually. Because I am a Type 1 diabetic, medically I cannot fast for any length of time. Therefore, for Lent, I'll abstain from mindlessly scrolling on social media and replace the time with reading and listening to things that will feed my soul.

PREPARING THE SOIL

I like to piddle with a garden. A couple of tomato plants. Maybe some green beans and squash. I even tried carrots one year. But before I can plant any seeds, I first need to prepare the soil.

Jesus knew this as he told the Parable of the Sower in Mark 4 to remind us that the quality of the soil of our lives determines whether the seeds of the gospel are able to take root and thrive.

People often choose to either give something up or take something on for Lent. Giving something up, like dessert or gossiping, is analogous to removing rocks or weeds from the soil of our spiritual lives. We all have habits that make it more difficult for spiritual fruit to take deeper root in our lives. Making a conscious choice to change these habits can be an important turning point in preparing our spiritual soil.

On the other hand, taking something on for Lent can be compared to adding good nutrients to our soil. Making a commitment to pray every day, reading Scripture regularly, or connecting more deeply with our faith community are positive ways we can enrich the soil of our spiritual lives.

While John the Baptist's words to "prepare the Way of the Lord" are most commonly heard during Advent, they are good advice for us during Lent as well, as we prepare to cultivate the fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control) in our lives.

Are you giving something up this Lent or taking on something new on? How might you cultivate the fruit of the Spirit more intentionally in your life during the season of Lent and beyond?

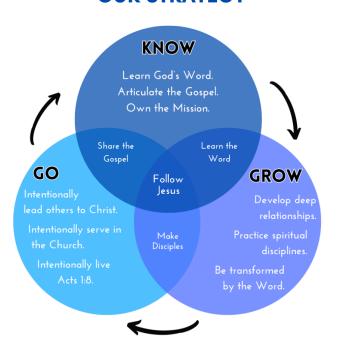

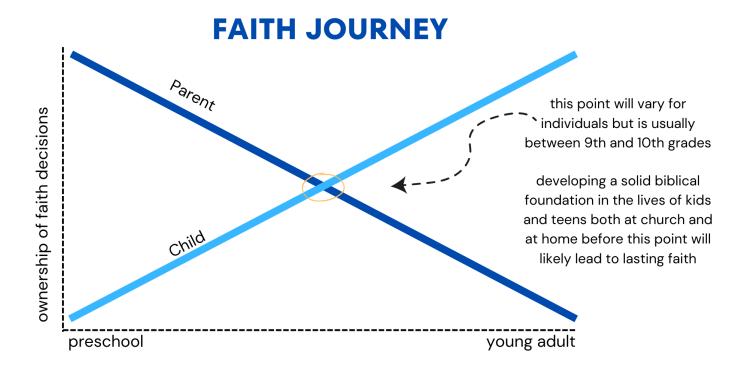

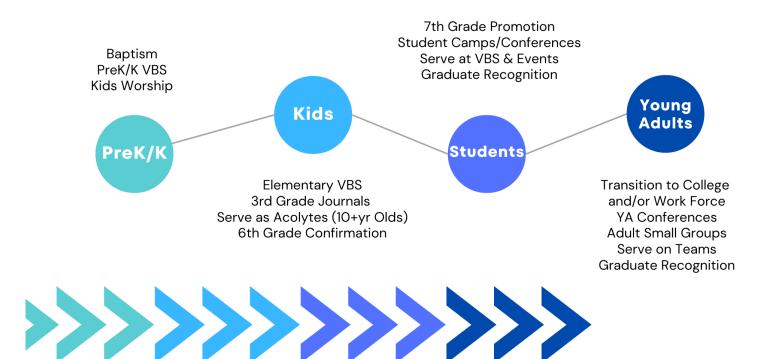
TRANSITIONS

Biblical Foundation for Family Ministry

Deut 6:1-9

"This is the command—the statutes and ordinances—the Lord your God has commanded me to teach you... Do this so that you may fear the Lord your God all the days of your life by keeping all his statutes and commands I am giving you, your son, and your grandson,... Listen, Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength. These words that I am giving you today are to be in your heart. Repeat them to your children. Talk about them when you sit in your house and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Bind them as a sign on your hand and let them be a symbol on your forehead. Write them on the doorposts of your house and on your city gates.

Mark 10:13-16

People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them, but the disciples rebuked them. When Jesus saw it, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me. Don't stop them, because the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." After taking them in his arms, he laid his hands on them and blessed them.

Romans 8:14-17

For all those led by God's Spirit are God's sons. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear. Instead, you received the Spirit of adoption, by whom we cry out, "Abba, Father!" The Spirit himself testifies together with our spirit that we are God's children, and if children, also heirs-heirs of God and coheirs with Christ-if indeed we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.
